Water main repairs will impact traffic on eastbound Belleview at Clarkson: Repairs to begin June 24 at 9 am

Englewood, CO: Eastbound traffic on Belleview Avenue at South Clarkson Street will be impacted by construction beginning at 9 am on Tuesday, June 24, 2014 and continuing for an estimated two days. A leak has developed on the Englewood water system's 24-inch steel water main on South Clarkson Street at East Belleview Avenue, and complete excavation at the site is necessary to repair the main.

The southernmost lane on eastbound Belleview Avenue at South Clarkson will be closed during the repairs. One eastbound lane will be open on Belleview at all times. The 5100 block of South Clarkson Street will also be closed during repairs. Motorists who need to access South Clarkson Street will be detoured via South Logan Street.

Because the water main is located in Greenwood Village and impacts Belleview Avenue (a Colorado Department of Transportation highway), Englewood's Utilities Department staff is working closely with both CDOT and the City of Greenwood Village to expedite repairs and minimize the impacts on local residents and motorists.

Motorists are advised to find alternate routes during construction. Once construction begins and the leak is pinpointed, crews will have a more precise estimate on how long repairs will take. City of Englewood, Colo. Employs Community Solar for Target Operations

BOULDER, COLO. – (June 20, 2014) In support of the City’s goals to reduce its energy costs and carbon footprint, The City of Englewood, Colo. is purchasing panels in a community solar array developed by Clean Energy Collective (CEC). The solar PV purchase is earmarked to offset the power needs for one of Englewood’s high energy-use locations.

Considered a pilot program to start, the City of Englewood is purchasing 42 solar panels in the Aurora/Arapahoe Community Solar Array at a cost of \$34,545. Payback of the system is estimated at less than 5 years. Along with renewable energy credits, the savings is expected to total more than \$215,000 over the next 20 years.

Part of Xcel Energy’s Solar*Rewards Community program, Xcel Energy customers—residential, commercial or municipal—have the opportunity to purchase solar power from a number of community-owned solar facilities built and operated by Clean Energy Collective. These medium-scale facilities are sited and maintained for maximum power production. Individual panel owners then receive credits directly on their monthly Xcel Energy bill for the power produced.

Although a popular public move towards more sustainable operations, community solar is also helping municipal entities better manage future budgeting and energy requirements, especially amid rising energy costs. Along with the City of Englewood in Colorado, the Town of Telluride, San Miguel County, and the City of Fort Collins are employing community solar to offset energy use for city and county operations.

“We are excited that the City of Englewood is on board,” said CEC’s chief operating officer Tom Sweeney. “More and more municipalities are finding it effectively serves their budgetary and environmental objectives.”

CEC has 11 community solar facilities operating or in development in Colorado, reaching more than 75% of state ratepayers. CEC also has facilities in New Mexico, Minnesota, Kansas, Wisconsin, Vermont, and Massachusetts.

Sprouts opens new South Broadway market in Englewood

New direction for Englewood redevelopment along Broadway

The City of Englewood celebrated the grand opening of the new Sprouts Farmers Market at 5001 S. Broadway, near Bellevue Avenue. This new grocery store fills an underserved need in the southern area of the community that has been lined by new and used car dealerships along auto row for years.

Sprouts worked closely with city officials to make this project happen at the site where Larry Miller Nissan previously operated its dealership. The Nissan dealership recently relocated to the E-470 corridor in Douglas County.

There were more than 200 customers lined up in advance of the store's grand opening for a promotional 20 percent off the total purchase. Sprouts new Store Manager Chris Hudson officially opened the store with city dignitaries, employees and corporate staff and then walked around the store welcoming customers who were checking out the new grocery store for the first time.

Englewood Mayor Randy Penn personally greeted shoppers and said hello to longtime friends who came for the event and to do some shopping.

"This will be a game changer for where South Broadway goes; this now changes the face of South Broadway maybe from some older shops and car dealers...to some major redevelopment," said Gary Sears, Englewood's soon-to-retire city manager. "We've been going after a different type of retailer for 10 years."

The new store somewhat resembles a considerably larger and more modern version of the old country grocery store, as it is adorned with wood signs and actual boxes stacked with abundant fresh produce.

"I'm just happy that we finally got a store that can provide affordable healthy food in the neighborhood," said Terrina Griggs, whose family lives two blocks away. "We've been waiting for this store to open since we knew it was going to be built on this spot."

This popular and growing national foods retail chain is proving to be a serious competitor to Whole Foods, King Soopers Fresh Fare and Lakewood-based Natural Grocers. Sprouts was recently featured in a *Bloomberg Business Week* article entitled, "Sprouts Beating Whole Foods in Price War, Analysis Shows." A comparable basket of 148 brand name items was 13 percent less with regular promotions. Without the aggressive on-going sales promotions, Sprouts would only have been 2 percent less expensive.

"They have pork ribs and chicken for \$1.99 a pound and the first 200 people got 20 percent off, they were even cheaper," said Colleen Mello, executive director of the Englewood Chamber of Commerce. "I was here for the ribbon cutting and I wasn't planning on shopping but after going in and seeing the prices that they have on all their meat, it's really cheap."

Sprouts hired 140 new staffers for the South Broadway store, while 21 employees were transferred from other area stores. The 27,000 sq. ft. grocery store cost around \$2.5 million to construct from the ground up.

"If you are looking for a healthier lifestyle, a healthier way of eating and looking to do it in a way that is

article as having 13 percent lower prices than Whole Foods due to their aggressive regular promotions.

good for your wallet, then Sprouts is the place you want to shop," said Scott North, senior vice president of operations for the chain.

This progressive grocery chain will be involved in the community and also partners with food banks in the area providing a multitude of food and produce items from all departments.

"Last year, Englewood City Council agreed to provide incentives to the developer of the property," said Darren Hollingsworth, the city's manager of economic development. "The incentives were instrumental in transforming the site from an auto-oriented business to a grocery-anchored retail development."

Englewood councilman pushes school board to accept TriCity charter

A group of residents is trying to open a new charter school in or near Englewood with the help of a charter school incubator, despite the Englewood School District Board of Education's opposition to previous charter school applications.

The backers of TriCity Academy are applying to the Littleton, Sheridan and Englewood school districts, but their intention is to get the school as close as possible to the boundaries of the Englewood School District to appeal to what founding member Rick Gillit called an underserved population in Englewood. Englewood's test scores have lagged behind other districts until recently.

"We want to be a feeder to the middle and high school — we want to make sure our students are well educated and have a good foundation, and scores should go up if it happens the way we want it to happen," said Gillit, who is also an Englewood City Council member.

The school also has the backing of Littleton Mayor Phil Cernanec and Arapahoe County Commissioner Nancy Doty.

Gillit has been part of a group that has tried to open a charter school in Englewood for the past few years and has been denied each time, originally with Englewood Academy and then Lloyd Carlton Academy, which was denied last year. He said backers have learned from their mistakes, such as not having a solid budget (TriCity Academy has private funding in the millions of dollars) or a potential building site (they have a few picked out now in and around Englewood).

Denise Mund, the president of Delta Schools Inc., a nonprofit charter school incubator, said she feels the TriCity's backers have a strong application this year and that it is about offering the choice of a Core Knowledge curriculum. But Mund and Gillit recognize the Englewood School District has been very skeptical of charter schools.

"We're not a group of people that wants to work outside the district, and we want to be a partner with the district," Mund said. "We believe in the parents' role to be able to choose an education that best meets the needs of their children's education."

Englewood School District Superintendent Brian Ewert said he was surprised the TriCity backers want to be partners, because he hadn't heard from them as of last week. He said the district is not against charter schools and knows one will probably open in Englewood eventually, but so far none has been able to meet board standards, such as providing transportation and meals to students, as well as having a groundswell of support for the charter school.

"I think the skepticism comes from not feeling there is a demand in the community for the charter," Ewert said.

Gillit said he is optimistic about TriCity's chances in Englewood because three of the members most hostile to previous charter proposals — Tom O'Connor, Scott Gorsky and Gene Turnbull — are no longer on the board. Littleton Public Schools already has two charter schools, and Gillit said Sheridan is interested.
