Parks and Recreation Update

The closing of the Sports Authority Campus has affected the fitness offerings and corporate admissions revenue. The monetary loss equates to about \$1,000 a month for those 5 fitness classes that were lost. In addition the Recreation Center will lose out on corporate admissions for the future. Staff will adjust the 2017 budget to account for the lost revenue and reduction of expenses.

MORE LOANS, NEW BRANCH FOR FIRSTBANK


FirstBank financed \$722.6 million in loans during the first quarter of 2016. That's up from the first quarter of 2015 when the Lakewood-based bank financed \$613 million in loans.

The loans are for equipment, construction, land development and commercial real estate and working lines of credit.

"We take great pride in providing businesses with the funds to expand their operations," said John Ikard, CEO of FirstBank, Colorado's largest locally-based bank and its second largest overall (after Wells Fargo & Co.).

Among the 1,400 business loans, Mindful Development, which built a new retail outlet in northwest Colorado Springs, received a \$4.5 million commercial real estate loan and Bel Shower Door, which specializes in custom-framed shower and tub doors, received a \$1.56 million loan for equipment.

The bank also announced that it opened a branch in Englewood, at the corner of South Logan Street and East Jefferson Avenue. The bank now has more than 120 locations in Colorado, Arizona and California.

Craig Hospital raises record-breaking \$1.8 million at the 15th annual PUSH Dinner

Craig Hospital's biggest fundraising event of the year, the annual PUSH dinner, was held on Saturday, April 30. More than 1300 people attended the event, which was presented by Great West Financial-Empower Retirement.

The gala event raised a record-breaking \$1.8 million to support Craig Hospital's programs, research, and patients.

PUSH support Craig's Programs of Excellence, including Therapeutic Recreation, Adaptive Technology, Music Therapy, Community Reintegration and education and tutoring programs – which are generally not covered by insurance.

PUSH funds also support research, including ongoing studies and clinical trials aimed at improving outcomes, reducing long-term complications, and enhancing quality of life for those affected by spinal cord and traumatic brain injury.

The PUSH paddle auction raised funds for the Craig Hospital Foundation's Patient Assistance Fund, which helps patients with minimal income or inadequate insurance travel to and from Craig, purchase equipment like wheelchairs and shower chairs, remodel homes for accessibility, train caregivers, pay mortgages and utility bills, and meet other urgent needs. Craig graduate and benefactor Don Digby and his wife Lydia made a \$300,000 challenge gift to encourage others to give. PUSH attendees met the challenge, donating \$365,875 during the paddle auction.

At the 2016 PUSH, the Inspiration Award was given to Mike Utley. On November 17, 1991, the Detroit Lions' offensive guard was paralyzed during an NFL game against the Los Angeles Rams at the Silverdome in Detroit, MI. Mike's courageous "Thumbs Up" gesture as he was carried from the field has come to symbolize his fighting spirit. Following his rehabilitation at Craig Hospital, Mike founded the Mike Utley Foundation to support select research, rehabilitation and education for spinal cord injuries.

Also at the dinner, South Metro Fire Fleet Services Bureau Chief Brian Brown and his wife Alice accepted the Dave and Gail Liniger Spirit of Craig

Award. This award recognizes a Craig graduate and/or family member who, through their community service, professional achievement, and personal support of Craig's patients, graduates, and mission, significantly brings to life the spirit of Craig Hospital to others in the community.

In 2006, Brian sustained a severe traumatic brain injury in a cycling accident on Mt. Evans. His rehabilitation at Craig made it possible for him to return to work 11 months post-injury. Brian and Alice are passionate Craig supporters and volunteers. They founded the Racing For Hope Cycling Classic, a competitive race to raise money for Craig.

The 2016 event was chaired by Linda and Don Childears.

Agency contracts as Englewood's service provider

One hundred and fifty years ago, the Volunteer Hook and Ladder Company No. 1 was organized as the first fire-fighting force in the Colorado Territory. That same year, Denver constructed s fire station at 1534 Lawrence St.

"A hand-pumping draft engine was purchased in 1867, but scant water supplies and manpower limited its use," according to the Denver Fire Department's colorful history.

Today, the department is a highly respected firefighting agency that also provides services to the adjacent communities of Englewood, Glendale, Sheridan and the Skyline Fire District. More than 1,000 uniformed firefighters and 50 support staff serve residents, businesses and visitors.

"It's a phenomenal milestone. It celebrates all those that have come before us that make us who we are today," Deputy Fire Chief Todd Bower said. "The citizenry that we serve has changed over time and is more immense than it was previously. The type of work that firefighters do is a lot more rigorous than it was in days gone by. So this timeframe of 150 years really celebrates the fact that we've grown as a city and grown as a fire department."

Several hundred people came together to celebrate the department's milestone May 21, at the Denver Firefighters Museum on Tremont Place. Children of all ages lined up to receive bucket rides in the 100-foot-

high Tower No. 9 truck and to interact with firefighters showing additional state-of-the-art vehicles.

Mayor Michael Hancock proclaimed it Denver Fire Department 150th Anniversary Day while Fire Chief Eric Tade was joined by retired members of the department, current firefighters and family members.

One year ago, Englewood contracted with Denver Fire to provide emergency and rescue services. City Manager Eric Keck said he was pleased by the level of service and partnership between the two cities.

"We are just proud to be a part of their history as well. Their department is a fantastically structured, managed and led department. They've been doing a fantastic job for us," he said. "... We congratulate Denver Fire for their long tenured history and look forward to our ongoing relationship moving forward."

Keck noted that many of Englewood's former firefighters have joined the active ranks of the DFD.

Last year's annual budget for the DFD was around \$130 million.

The survey will be active through June 17 and will be publicized through the resources of Arapahoe Douglas Works, City of Englewood, and Greater Englewood Chamber of Commerce. When the survey results are finalized this information will be used to determine feasibility of demand for a job fair. These findings will also be presented to City Council.
