City of Englewood offices closed February 18 (Furlough Day) and February 21 (Presidents' Day)

Englewood, CO: City of Englewood administrative offices will be closed on Friday, February 18 for a furlough day and Monday, February 21 in observance of Presidents' Day.

February 18 is the first of four employee furlough days scheduled for 2011. All City of Englewood offices will be closed for the furlough day, including the Englewood Civic Center, Englewood Public Library, Englewood Municipal Court, the Englewood Recreation Center, and the Malley Senior Recreation Center. All emergency services will be maintained, as will water and wastewater operations.

On Monday, February 21, all Englewood Civic Center offices will be closed for the holiday, including the Library and Municipal Court. The Englewood Recreation Center and Malley Center will be open on February 21. Broken Tee Englewood golf course will be open both days. The City Council meeting normally scheduled for the second Monday of the month (February 21) will take place on Tuesday, February 22.



Hargrove replaces Long in Englewood

Englewood's new library director, Dorothy Hargrove, began her post at the Englewood Public Library on Feb. 1. She replaces Hank Long, who

served as director of the Englewood Library from 1990 until his retirement in December. Hargrove has 32 years experience in library service, including 16 years in a management capacity. Her most recent post was at the Douglas County Library District, where she managed the Highlands Ranch and Roxborough branches. While there, she transformed these branches from two of the lowest performing libraries in the district to two of the highest performing.

She has also held positions at the Longmont Public Library, Denver Public Library, Arapahoe County Library District and a previous stint at Englewood Public Library as a reference librarian during the mid-1990s.

She holds a masters degree in library science from the University of Denver and an MBA from DU's Daniels College of Business. She earned her undergraduate degree in English literature from Wellesley College in Massachusetts.

Hargrove's key qualifications include an emphasis on providing excellent customer service, fundraising and grant-writing, building strong volunteer programs and citizen support groups, planning, budgeting, team-building, and developing creative cultural programming.



Changes Coming to Denver Union Station




There are some big changes taking place at Denver Union Station (DUS) beginning this week. Severe weather conditions are delaying the changes a few days, so Amtrak's switch to its temporary station and the closing of the pedestrian tunnel will now occur on Friday, Feb. 4. The RTD FasTracks program will transform DUS into a multimodal transportation hub, integrating shuttle, bus, light rail and passenger rail. To accommodate redevelopment construction, passengers will soon experience operational changes at DUS.

- On Feb. 4, Amtrak will relocate from DUS to a temporary station behind Coors Field at 1800 21st St. (21st Street and Wewatta Street). Passengers should plan to be picked up and dropped off at the temporary location due to limited parking. Amtrak operations will return to DUS in 2014.
- Also on Feb. 4, the DUS pedestrian tunnel (pictured above) will permanently close. Passengers should use the 16th Street Mall Shuttle or the 16th Street sidewalk to get to and from the light rail platform. The art, benches, signs and historic items from the tunnel will be salvaged and possibly reused in the next phase of DUS.

- On Feb. 9, buses that use the Bus/HOV lane will no longer pick up and drop off passengers behind DUS. All passengers who board/deboard Express and Regional routes at DUS Gates B, C and D will now do so at Market Street Station.

FastFacts



Staff Recommendation for FasTracks

- RTD has completed the 2011 FasTracks Annual Program Evaluation (APE). The capital cost to implement the program by 2019 is \$6.7 billion, consistent with the 2010 APE.
- At the RTD Board study session on Jan. 25, staff recommended short-term and long-term options for completing the FasTracks program. The presentation is posted [here](#) on the FasTracks website.
- Staff recommended that the remaining \$305 million be invested in all of the FasTracks projects either not in construction or under contract, with the majority being dedicated to U.S. 36 BRT Phase 2, I-225 and North Metro.
- The \$305 million in currently available funds would be committed as follows:
 - U.S. 36 BRT - Complete managed lanes to Interlocken (\$90 million)
 - North Metro - Complete from DUS to Stock Show Complex (\$90 million)
 - I-225 - Complete from Nine-Mile to Iliff (\$90 million)
 - Northwest Rail - Complete Longmont Station (\$17 million)
 - Central Corridor - Additional technical analysis (\$0.5 million)
 - Southeast Corridor - Final design and federal environmental process (\$9 million)
 - Southwest Corridor - Relocate Union Pacific Railroad track (\$8.5 million)
- Staff also recommended pursuit of a .2% sales tax increase election in November 2011. This would complete 85 - 90% of the program by 2022 and complete the whole

program by 2027.

- Extending the schedule for completion of the whole program to 2027 increases the overall cost due to additional cost escalation. As a result, the capital cost for the program under the staff recommendation would increase from \$6.7 billion to \$7.2 billion.
- At the Feb. 8 FasTracks Monitoring Committee meeting, the Board will consider the 2011 APE and financial plan and whether to embed in the plan a sales tax increase and timing to pursue the tax increase.
- At the Feb. 22 RTD Board meeting, the public will have another opportunity to provide input to the Board. The Board is scheduled to take action on the 2011 APE that evening.

Project Progress

Gold Line Corridor

- The selected team for the Eagle P3 Project, Denver Transit Partners, is working on final design in anticipation of a Notice to Proceed for Phase Two, which includes the Gold Line and short segment of Northwest Rail to south Westminster. That would follow award of a Full Funding Grant Agreement from the Federal Transit Administration, which is anticipated in late spring 2011.
- Right-of-way acquisition continues on the portion of the corridor leading north to the site of the commuter rail maintenance facility, part of the Eagle P3 project Phase One work.

U.S. 36 BRT Corridor

- The project team is reviewing all funding options for the corridor, including Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (TIFIA), New Starts and American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) Two funds.
- Construction on the Table Mesa Pedestrian Bridge and queue jumps at four intersections are scheduled to begin in early 2011.
- Commitments were proposed in each of the three implementation packages to build the managed lane to Interlocken.

Northwest Rail Corridor

- The first segment of the rail line to south Westminster is included in Phase Two of the Eagle P3 project.
- Construction on this segment is anticipated to begin sometime in 2011.
- The staff recommendation presented to the RTD Board includes using some of the \$305 million currently available to build the end-of-line station in Longmont, which RTD can use for bus operations.

North Metro Corridor

- The North Metro team released the Final EIS to key stakeholders last week and will

release it to the public this Friday.

- Public hearings are scheduled for Feb. 16 and 17.
- The project team has identified options for continuing progress on the corridor with some of the remaining \$305 million, which includes building North Metro to the Stock Show.

East Corridor

- A major utility relocation project is set to begin to move fiber optic lines within the Union Pacific Railroad right-of-way between Coors Field downtown and Airport Boulevard in Aurora. This will make room for the commuter rail tracks. The work is expected to take about four months.
- Right-of-way acquisition is underway with offers going to parcel owners.
- Planning continues for other utility relocations, some of which already have been made. Denver Water is relocating a major line at Monaco Street and will start work on another major water line relocation at Havana Street in February.

Central Corridor Extension

- As part of the short-term options for FasTracks, RTD staff recommends conducting more technical analysis on streetcar operations for the Central Corridor.

I-225 Corridor


- Final design for Segment One of the I-225 Corridor was completed at the end of 2010. The City of Aurora has reviewed the Segment One design and submitted comments on the design. The project team will incorporate comments from RTD, CDOT and City of Aurora for the final design package submittal which is expected by the end of January.
- Among the short-term options to keep FasTracks moving forward the RTD staff recommends building I-225 from Nine Mile to Iliff.

Southeast Corridor Extension

- Among the short-term recommendations by staff to keep all projects moving forward is completing final design and a federal environmental process on Southeast Corridor Extension to prepare for a future Small Starts funding opportunity.

Southwest Corridor Extension

- Staff recommends designing and constructing the Union Pacific Railroad relocation on Southwest Corridor to prepare for the future build-out of the whole extension.
- Coordination with CDOT regarding the alignment and planned CDOT flyover at Santa Fe and C-470 highway remains ongoing. CDOT secured funding for the flyover. The project began in 2010.



West Corridor

- Crews continue deck pours on the Consolidated Mainline Bridge which spans the industrial park in Denver.
- Foundations for the Garrison Street passenger station are near completion.
- The final activities for the Auraria Station relocation are in full swing. Electrical systems and grading crews are in the area to relocate the light rail tracks that currently serve the Auraria Station.
- Crews will begin construction of a large drainage culvert this week on Perry Street between 10th and 13th Avenue. This activity requires the closure of Perry Street through the end of May.

Denver Union Station

- The temporary Amtrak Station at 21st and Wewatta opens on Feb. 4, 2011. All Amtrak service will be moving to this location until 2014.
- The pedestrian tunnel will close permanently on Feb. 4, 2011. Transit customers should use either the 16th Street Mall Shuttle or the 16th Street sidewalk to get to and from the light rail platform.
- On Feb. 9, 2011, the Bus/HOV lane behind Union Station will close to accommodate construction. Buses using the bus/HOV lane will no longer pick up and drop off transit customers behind Denver Union Station. All transit customers who board/deboard at Denver Union Station Gates B, C and D will now do so at Market Street Station.
- Crews are continuing work on the new light rail platform adjacent to the Consolidated Main Line (CML). Crews are installing track, gutters on the canopies and windscreens.
- The last section of wall for the underground bus facility will be poured in early February. Crews are also working on grading and pouring the base slab for the west entrance into the bus facility. Work on the top deck (roof) of the structure continues. Once complete, crews will begin work on the interior.
- The DUSPA Board of directors meets on the first Thursday of the month. Meetings are held at the office of Hogan Lovells, 1200 17th St., Suite 1500, at 1:30 p.m. All meetings are open to the public. Meeting materials are posted on the project website.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Englewood City Council for the contribution of \$10,200 to provide support to low-income people residing in the City of Englewood.

As you know, since the recent economic downturn, the number of people needing assistance to get back on their feet keeps increasing. With your help, we are able to continue to provide basic services for the homeless, the hungry, and the poor in our community.

Inter-Faith provides a *hand-up, not a hand-out* by giving motivation, incentive, and by providing services not available elsewhere in western Arapahoe and northern Douglas Counties. Inter-Faith reaches out to families through basic services, moral support, and educational programs. For 46 years, the Board of Directors, staff, and many volunteers have been devoted to building an organization, which meets an unfilled need in our community. Inter-Faith is always responsive and provides those in need with opportunities to learn, to grow, and to become or continue to be active and productive members of our community.

Last year, Inter-Faith assisted more than 16,500 individuals with homeless prevention services, prescriptions, transportation, birth certificates, victim assistance, food, and clothing. Seven hundred eighty eight (788) new low-income individuals, families and senior citizens came to our door for assistance. Six hundred sixty seven (667) children received new clothes and school supplies through the Ready, Set, School! Program, and an additional 324 children received backpacks and school supplies. Inter-Faith also spent \$11,824 to provide 29,560 school lunches to low-income children through the Food for Learning Program.

Again, thank you. It would be extremely difficult for Inter-Faith to provide for clients without the City of Englewood's support.





SUBJECT: Englewood Depot Update

During Executive Session on Monday, January 10, staff discussed with City Council the potential sale of the Englewood Depot to Laurie Jekel. Council discussed the current zoning and Ms. Jekel's request for consideration of joint application for a Planned Unit Development to allow for additional uses of the site. While Council indicated that they would consider a joint PUD application, they also indicated that a formal offer to purchase must precede any other actions.

Following the meeting, I related Council's comments to Ms. Jekel. She thanked Council for their consideration and updated me on her current status. Because she must vacate her current location by April 1, she has found an interim location for her operation. And while she remains very interested in the Englewood Depot, she is not yet prepared to proceed, due to concerns for her ability to finance the project. Her estimate for rehabilitation of the structure is \$325,000. In addition, she would have to make some site improvements, which could raise her cost to nearly \$400,000, not including the cost of purchasing the ground.

The cost of the rehabilitation and the relative small usable size of the structure (approximately 1600 sq. ft. on the main level) have posed problems for Ms. Jekel in obtaining financing. In addition, she is concerned about the future value of the Depot at the point that she would retire and either sell or lease to a third party for another use.

Given the cost and financing issues and the fact that she has secured a lease space at least on an interim basis, Ms. Jekel is not prepared to make a formal offer to purchase at this time. While she remains interested in the Depot and would like to continue to explore the purchase, she also understands that the City cannot hold the property in the event that another buyer comes forward.

ENGLEWOOD TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING

Minutes of January 13, 2011

 The regular bi-monthly meeting of the Englewood Transportation Advisory Committee was called to order by Chair Anderson at 6:34 p.m. in the City Council Conference Room, City of Englewood Civic Center.

Roll Call.

Present: David Anderson, Andy Berger, Danielle Gregory, Daryl Kinton, James Weeks, Randy Penn (Not voting), Rick Kahm, ex officio (Not voting).

Absent/Excused: Jennifer Jones.

A quorum was present.

 **Approval of Minutes**

Chair Anderson acknowledged that a quorum was not present at the Special Meeting held on October 14, 2010, and therefore approval of the minutes from that meeting is not required.

 **Public Comment**

There were no visitors present.

 **Old Business**

Chair Anderson updated Committee Members on the status of ETAC's proposal to City Council allowing low speed vehicles (golf cars, under 50cc scooters, Segways, and "toys") on Englewood streets. Mr. Anderson reported that the ordinance was passed by City Council on first reading on December 6, 2010 and on second and final reading on December 18th; the ordinance should be in full force by late January, 2011.

Sgt. O'Connor presented draft forms and stickers that will be used to register low speed vehicles once the ordinance is passed on final reading. Registration fees were discussed. To avoid illegal low speed vehicles driving on the streets to register at the Police Station, Sgt. O'Connor said that officers will most likely conduct inspections and issue registrations upon appointment at the home or business of vehicle owners. An information article to advise of the registration process is being prepared for posting in the Englewood Citizen as well as the Englewood Herald, the City web page and possibly the Denver Post. Council Liaison Penn inquired whether or not residents from other jurisdictions driving their low speed vehicles in Englewood would be required to obtain an Englewood registration; Sgt. O'Connor responded that the ordinance requires all drivers of those vehicles to obtain an Englewood registration so that they are aware of designated streets as well as other requirements. Mr. Penn advised that he will find out City of Littleton's registration fee. Discussion ensued.



New Business

With regard to a number of potential new residents who will eventually inhabit a new Habitat for Humanity housing development on Quincy Avenue east of Navajo St., Committee Member Kinton inquired about the absence of sidewalk along the east side of Navajo leading to the Oxford Light Rail Station. Director Kahm stated that that roadway was constructed by CDOT a number of years ago; then, and now, right-of-way for sidewalk along the east side of Navajo was/is not available. Brief discussion ensued regarding bridge construction, additional traffic through Englewood, etc.



Director's Choice

- Traffic Engineer Vostry advised that Englewood is currently participating in a Broadway Signal Re-timing Program with DRCOG to improve traffic flow along the Broadway corridor through Denver and Englewood. Mr. Vostry noted that this program is providing approximately \$30,000 worth of services to the City free of charge. Discussion ensued.
- Director Kahm reported that the Police Department has two Speed Trailers that have aged to the point that replacement is necessary in order to receive accurate traffic data. These units have consistently, over the past 18 years, been beneficial in helping with traffic calming as well as detecting trouble spots in Englewood's traffic patterns. Mr. Kahm suggested that ETAC has funding available if they wish to participate with the Police Department in the cost of replacing the two units. Following discussion regarding data collection, cost and benefits of new updated units, etc., Chair Anderson made a motion, seconded by Committee Member Weeks, to approve funding from the Transportation Action Plan account for the purchase of one of the two speed trailers at an estimated cost of \$13,000. Motion passed unanimously. Sgt. O'Connor noted he is checking the possibility of a trade-in value on the old units that can be figured into the purchase price of new units.



Chairperson's Choice

- Chair Anderson inquired about the City's new program of applying ice-slicer on roadways. Director Kahm stated that staff is happy with the result, considering limited snowfall thus far this season. The product melts snow with temperatures as low as 0 degrees, and there is no sand to sweep after storms, which provides staff more opportunity to achieve other tasks, such as plowing or breaking ice on the south side of avenues. To Council Liaison Penn's inquiry, Sgt. O'Connor said that patrol officers advise residents and businesses, when observed plowing snow from their driveways or parking lots into the streets, of the City's ordinance prohibiting that manner of snow disposal. Discussion ensued.
- Mr. Anderson recently learned that Community Development has commissioned some studies of the downtown and hospital districts that will include transportation issues. Mr. Penn stated he will follow up to ensure those issues are discussed with ETAC. Mr. Penn said the studies will actually include ten different areas in Englewood.
- Mr. Anderson reported that Committee Member Gregory has elected to not apply for reappointment when her term on ETAC expires on 02/01/11. Additionally, Committee Member Weeks is resigning from his

position because of other conflicts and will submit his letter of resignation tomorrow. Brief discussion ensued. Mr. Anderson suggested delaying the upcoming election of officers, usually conducted bi-annually in March, until such time that new members become familiar with the committee.



Committee Members' Choice

- Council Liaison Penn stated that City Council continues to diligently consider the City's budget. Mr. Penn advised that he attended the Metro Mayors Conference, held recently at Englewood Civic Center, and was pleased that great reviews continue to come in on the Englewood CityCenter.
- Committee Member Gregory offered everyone her best with their continued work on ETAC.
- Committee Member Weeks thanked everyone for his experience on ETAC. Brief discussion ensued regarding activity on the Englewood Urban Renewal Authority, on which Mr. Weeks serves as Chair.
- Sgt. O'Connor wished the two exiting members the best of luck, and thanked everyone for their continued support.



Adjournment

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:50 p.m.
