Utility Line Protection Program Now Available To Residents

Englewood, CO: The City of Englewood is introducing a new program available to homeowners, provided through a partnership with the National League of Cities (NLC) and Service Line Warranties of America (SLWA). The Service Line Warranty program provides low cost, worry free warranty protection for sewer lines.

"Many citizens are unaware that they are responsible for the sewer lines that go from their houses to the utility connection. If these lines break or leak, repairs can be very expensive," said Jim Woodward, Mayor. Longtime pizza place to keep making plenty of dough

It is perhaps a natural inclination, when taking over a business to make changes, to attempt to imprint the operation with one's own name or style.

That won't be happening at Frank the Pizza King.

"I'm gonna keep everything the same," said Matthew Krascek, 25. "It's been working for 50 years — I probably won't change a thing."

That's a comforting thought for fans of the little corner shop in Englewood, which last month indeed celebrated a half-century in business.

Opened by Hungarian immigrant Frank Krascek just six years after he arrived in the U.S., the restaurant has been an area staple for decades. It's also been a family operation — Frank's son Walt now runs the place with his sister, Maria, and his wife, Ellen.

Matthew, who said he was teething on the crust, is the heir apparent — if and when his parents and aunt decide to slow down.

"It depends on my legs, how long they hold out," said Maria, who started working in the restaurant some 45 years ago, at age 10. "My mom's legs

kind of went out on her, but she used to just sit here and watch everything — maybe that's what I'll do."

One would be hard-pressed to find a local who hasn't eaten at Frank's, drawn by the combination of the continuity and the consistency of the food — the recipes are the same as when Frank bought the shop in 1951

— diners soon find themselves as interwoven in the operation as the Krasceks and their employees.

"There are customers who babysat me when I was little," Matthew said.

"Our cook has been here 30-some years. We've got four employees who have been here 20 to 30 years," Maria continued. "And the custom-

ers are all family — all the employees are family and all the customers are family."

When they lived in the area, it wasn't unusual for John Elway and Champ Bailey to drop in.

When he owned an auto dealership up the street, Denver Broncos Hall of Fame running back Floyd Little was a regular, often getting into deep, philosophical discussions while sharing a slice with Maria's mother.

"He and Grandma were best buds," Matthew said.

In a nod to the here and now and social media, the restaurant set up a Facebook page about three months ago and has already drawn more than 500 "likes" — and when Broncos rookie offensive tackle Orlando Franklin asked his Twitter followers for suggestions on a place to eat, the overwhelming response was to go to Frank's.

"He had some pizzas and some wings," Matthew said. "I think he liked it — he said he'll be back."

Just like everyone else has for more than 50 years.

Englewood's Duncan Park to get upgrades

Englewood's Duncan Park is planning for a new look, including new additions based on residents' desires and the removal of a structure in the park.

The nearby All Souls Catholic School has an early education center in the park, and is building an addition to its school and will move out of the park building next year.

When the school district decided to sell the property a few years ago, the neighborhood wanted the 3.3-acre property at South Pennsylvania Street and Chenango Avenue preserved as a park.

Parks and Recreation Director Jerrell Black said the city worked out a three-year purchase agreement, utilizing a \$200,000 Great Outdoor Colorado grant and \$250,000 from Arapahoe County's Open Space program, with the remainder coming from county shareback funds.

The purchase was concluded in 2010.

The city also has a \$70,000 grant for planning and design to convert the parcel into a more functional park, Black said. In about four to six weeks, the city will begin meetings with neighborhood residents about the park's design.

Additions could include picnic shelters, restrooms, an athletic field or other features.


"The building is in the center of the park, so changes will allow the park to be opened up as far as amenities," Black added.

It currently has a playground, a small athletic field for youth sports and a dog off-leash area.

The plan is for the study to be completed by spring of next year.

Tax reauthorization on fall ballot

Keeping it green in Arapahoe county will take additional greenbacks.

County voters will be asked to reauthorize a .25 percent open space sales and use tax on the Nov. 1 election ballot to continue to enhance parks, preserve natural and heritage areas, and build trails.

County officials feel there is citizen support for the 10-year-old program.

The resolution has only minor changes to the original ballot question, including a 50 percent share-back for participating cities and towns and a competitive grant program for cities and special districts.

Revisions include allowing a doubling of the amount of shareback monies directed toward maintenance, a one percent hike in administrative costs and a half-cent increase for heritage areas, including the 17 Mile House Farm Park and the Arapahoe County Fairgrounds and Regional Park.

The county began collecting the tax in 2004; it will expire at the end of 2013, unless voters approve the extension.

More than \$66 million from the Open Space Fund has gone to municipalities since the program began. Also, nearly \$16 million in competitive grants have been awarded.

Arapahoe County Commissioner Susan Beckman said bringing together local entities in working groups has been a successful model for funding regional open space projects.

"This is a way to focus, it's a way to bring people together to create a mission and a vision and a public value in a smaller area that everybody can focus on," Beckman said.

The South Platte working group, for instance, leveraged \$25 million toward enhancements along the South Platte River corridor.

"That project was so successful

that we've taken that model and have applied it to the Cherry Creek Trail, as well as the Highline Canal," said Communication Services Specialist Nichole Parmelly.

Beckman said residents value open space.

"We try to make what we do with that money very visible — and we try to do what the polls show are what people want, and that's trails, connectivity, open space that has public access to it, parks and then grants back to the cities..." she said.

Shannon Carter, Open Space Intergovernmental Relations Director, said cities and other stakeholders want the reauthorization assurance for their long-range budget planning. The working group model is unprecedented, and the county was asked to present the concept to a conference of the National Parks and Recreation Association in Atlanta in the near future.

The competitive grants allow local communities to build parks, structures like shelters and in Sheridan recently, refurbish a worn baseball field.

In Englewood, Parks Director Jerrell Black is planning improvements at Duncan Park, and acknowledges open space funds were imperative to that project.

"These projects are just a sampling of what the benefits of the open space sale tax has brought to all the communities in the county, and if we did not have that, these would probably not occur," he said.

Since it began, officials say the program has conserved more than 18,000 acres, built more than 30 miles of trails and created and improved neighborhood and regional parks.

KENT PLACE INFORMATION SHEET

AS OF: 9/2/2011

The information provided below is intended to be a current status update on the Kent Place project schedule, projected uses and construction related coordination items. All information is subject to change and will be updated on a bi-weekly basis. Updates are denoted in RED below.

Off-Site Improvements:

- Improvements include University Blvd. widening, lengthening of the southbound right-turn and southbound left-turn deceleration lanes on University approaching Hampden, the installation of a new traffic signal on University at the Kent Place project entrance, utility (water and storm sewer) improvements, and the installation of a privacy wall, sidewalk and landscaping on the east side of University.
- Permits Issued:
 - On May 5, 2011 Hampden Avenue Water Line Plans were approved by CDOT.
 - On July 15, 2011 CDOT issued the State Highway Access Permit for the Kent Place Access to State Highway 285 (Hampden Avenue).
 - On July 15, 2011 Arapahoe County approved the University Boulevard Improvement Plans.
 - On July 18, 2011 the City of Englewood issued the following Permits:
 - Public Right of Way Concrete – This permit is for off-site concrete improvements.
 - Public Right of Way Excavation Permit – This permit is for off-site street cuts to allow for the installation of sewer, water, storm and asphalt overlay.
 - Grading, Erosion, Sediment Control Permit – This permit is for off-site grading, erosion and sediment control.
- Construction Started - August 1, 2011
- Anticipated Completion - November 1, 2011. Traffic signal may follow.
- Parking – All contractor parking will be on the project site.
- Construction Access:
 - University Blvd. north of the project site is NOT a designated truck route, therefore project related Semi-trucks are confined to the project frontage and not permitted to travel north of the project site.
- Off- Site Construction Hours:
 - University Boulevard – per Englewood roadway standard: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Lane restrictions on University are likely during off-site construction. Delays should be expected.
 - Hampden Avenue – per CDOT Access Permit lane closure is allowed between 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and between 7:00 p.m. to 5:30 a.m.

- Traffic Impact Study:
 - Traffic generation by current plan vs. 2006 approved plan using similar trip rate methodology:
 - 10% reduction in daily trips from the project site.
 - 10% decrease to the AM peak hour trip volumes
 - 8% decrease to the PM peak hour trip volumes
 - The design provides for interconnectivity and coordination between the new traffic signal and the existing signal at University & Hampden which will help manage queuing between the intersections. The new signal will also provide an opportunity for additional gaps on northbound University north of the site for exiting from side streets.
 - To help mitigate existing and future peak hour queuing and access along southbound University Ave, the project proposes to add Do-Not-Block intersection markings and signage at the Floyd Place and Floyd Avenue intersections north of the project. These improvements will assist traffic in turning into and out of these side streets along University.

On-Site Improvements:

- Project to include (see attached site plan and updates at www.continuumpartners.com/projects/kentplace.html):
 - A 30,000 square foot grocery store with a 10,000 square foot mezzanine for storage and food preparation. The grocery store will be the first store of this type for King Soopers and will emphasize fresh and organic foods presented with a market feel in a concept unique to this location. The store will feature chef-prepared items, along with special selections such as artisan breads, expanded specialty cheeses, freshly prepared sushi, and chef-prepared bistro meals. Expanded natural and organic products will be available throughout the entire market. Additionally, there will be specialty items prepared in the produce, meat, and seafood departments.
 - Approximately 14,000 square feet of retail and restaurant space.
 - Approximately 4,000 square foot free-standing Bank with limited drive-through service anticipated. A PUD amendment will be required for the drive-through and will be submitted once details and layout are determined.
 - Multifamily residential- Forum Real Estate Group (www.Forumre.com) to develop a 300-unit project, standing 4 stories tall above parking and stepping down along adjacent property lines in accordance with the PUD bulk planes.
- On July 18, 2011 the City of Englewood issued a Building Permit for the on-site retaining wall, zoning site plan, and on-site infrastructure including underground utilities, roads, retaining walls, sidewalks and landscaping.
- Elevation Submittal: Color elevations for the market were submitted to the City of Englewood on June 16, 2011 written comments were received from City staff on July 13, 2011. We are currently working on revised elevations based on City and neighbor comments. A meeting with City staff was held on August 9th. Market elevations to be re-submitted September 7, 2011.
- Retail Infrastructure Construction Start - August 22, 2011
- Anticipated Retail Building Construction Start – December 1, 2011
- Anticipated Retail Opening - October 3, 2012
- Parking – All contractor parking will be on the project site.

- **Construction Access –**
 - University Blvd. north of the project site is NOT a designated truck route, therefore project related Semi-trucks are confined to the project frontage and not permitted to travel north of the project site.
 - Semi-trucks are not permitted to turn left from northbound University into the site until a traffic signal is installed.
 - Construction traffic will also utilize a right-in, right-out access along westbound Hampden Ave.
- **On-Site Construction Hours –** City Code allowed construction hours are 6 a.m. to 9 p.m., per the PUD construction hours are restricted to 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Contractor is currently working 6:30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m. (Note: The end time is subject to change dependent on schedule status.)

Dear Englewood City Council Members,

As you are aware, I have reached out to the seniors in the community in order to hear their concerns with switching from a flat-rate account to a metered-rate account. I wrote opinion articles in the Englewood Herald and the Villager with my e-mail address and I have walked the streets personally discussing the issue with seniors. I have also had the neighbors of these affected seniors contact me in order to understand the problem and to have me discuss the issue with their concerned senior neighbors and their caretakers. I also tried to have an informal meeting on the issue at the Malley Senior Center. Most of the seniors I have talked to understand they are being overcharged, but feel overwhelmed by the conversion process and are hesitant to have a fluctuating water bill when they are on a fixed income. Some seniors have a strong opinion that since they have been overpaying for their water for years that they should not have to pay for the cost of the meters, especially when they are on a limited, fixed income. There is a group of flat-rate customers who; prefer having an unlimited amount of water since that is what they are used to, do not trust the City, and/or are hesitant to change without complete and clear information.

I believe these three concerns could be addressed and appreciate that the Utility Department is starting to provide updated information on the conversion process and recently advertised the Englewood Meter Assistance Program in The Citizen. I feel that more effort could be made to get the information to the affected seniors, including a meeting at the Malley Senior Center. The fluctuating water bill could be fixed by allowing seniors to have a payment-levelized bill. As I understand it, our billing software cost about \$900,000 and would be able to handle this program. The Water and Sewer Board discussed the possibility of the City (Water Enterprise Fund) paying for the meter conversion for the last 2,000 people, but expressed reluctance since all the prior residents have paid for the conversion themselves. However, the Water and Sewer Board did want to look into possible grant funding from the Colorado Water Conservation Board to pay for the meter conversion costs. Nobody at the meeting was aware of any other financing alternatives for the last 2,000 people on the flat-rate. I have discussed the issue with Deborah Burrell (CWCB) and she indicated that money was not available through the CWCB for this purpose, but directed me to another State agency. After talking to 3 different State and local agencies I have identified two programs that may pay the cost of the meter conversion for low-income, seniors.

The Handyman Grant Program, which is administered through the Englewood Community Development Department, and the independent organization Rebuilding Together both have funding available that could be used for upgrading the water line with a meter. Both of these programs receive money from HUD Community Development Block Grants and redistribute the money to qualified residents. Based on my discussions with Janet Grimmett of the Englewood Community Development Department, the Handyman Grant Program can provide a grant up to \$1,000 for Englewood residents that are 60+ years old and meet the "80-percent income limits".

This income limit, which includes all income not just taxable income, is \$43,800 for one person and \$50,050 for two people. I will be forwarding the information on these grant programs to the seniors who have expressed their concerns to me and hope the City will also help provide the information to the affected residents. As I have stated before, I believe that the City of Englewood should be helping our seniors as much as possible with this meter conversion process.

SUBJECT: August 2011 Fire Department Monthly Summary

Attached is the monthly summary for August, 2011. The Fire Department responded to 423 calls for service during August. This represents a record for the most calls in a single month. In 2010, the Fire Department responded to 334 calls during the same time period. Year to date, The Fire Department has responded to 2,787 calls for service, compared to 2,610 calls in 2010.

During the month of August, Fire Department personnel completed 98 primary inspections and 28 follow-up inspections. The total square footage inspected was 1,744,286.

During the month of August, Fire Department personnel completed 1,356 staff hours of training.
